Summary

The objective of the guide is to provide a working document for contracting Parties (Members) and cooperating non-contracting Parties (collectively referred to as “CPCs”) to use in the implementation of the IOTC Resolutions while reporting data and information to the Commission. The content is divided into five sections.

The first section provides a detailed overview of what data and information to report on a monthly basis, in accordance with the specified deadline.

The second section presents a detailed overview of what data and information must be reported at the same deadline as the Implementation Report.

The third section guides CPCs on data and information which must be reported on an event basis (no fixed date for the deadline is specified).

The last two sections list obligations for vessels and prohibitions or bans for vessels.

At the end of the Guide a register of submissions and a notebook are provided.

- a) as part of the IOTC 1RC electronic form used to report nominal catches, the Secretariat shall include a matrix by IOTC species as well as the most commonly caught elasmobranch species according to records of catches and incidents as established in Resolution 15/01 on the recording of catch and effort data by fishing vessels in the IOTC area of competence (or any subsequent superseding Resolution) and main IOTC gear groups on the basis of the format set out in Annex II of this Resolution;

Paragraph 2:

Contracting Parties and Cooperating Non-Contracting Parties shall require all purse seine vessels to retain on board and then land, to the extent practicable, the following non-targeted species or species group; other tunas, rainbow runner, dolphinfish, triggerfish, billfish, wahoo, and barracuda, except fish considered unfit for human consumption as defined in paragraph 4b (i), and/or species which are prohibited from retention, consumption, or trade through domestic legislations and international obligations.

Resolution 19/04 *Concerning the establishment of an IOTC record of vessels authorised to operate in the IOTC Area.*

OBLIGATION REQUIRED: VESSELS TO CARRY ON BOARD AUTHORISATION TO FISH AND/OR TRANSHIP AND CERTIFICATE OF VESSEL REGISTRATION

Paragraph 11:

The flag CPCs of the vessels on the record shall:

- c) take necessary measures to ensure that their AFVs on the IOTC Record keep on board valid certificates of vessel registration and valid authorisation to fish and/or tranship;

- b) Marker buoys and similar objects floating and on the surface, and intended to indicate the location of fixed fishing gear, shall be clearly marked at all time with the letter(s) and/or number(s) of the vessel to which they belong;

OBLIGATION REQUIRED: VESSELS TO CARRY ON BOARD BOUND FISHING NATIONAL LOGBOOK WITH CONSECUTIVELY NUMBERED PAGES

Paragraph 20:

Each Contracting Party and Cooperating Non-Contracting Party with the IOTC shall ensure that all their respective fishing vessels of 24 meters or above and vessels less than 24 meters if fishing outside their EEZ, and are registered on the IOTC Record of fishing vessels and authorised to fish in the IOTC area of competence, keep a bound fishing national logbook with consecutively numbered pages. The original recordings contained in the fishing logbooks shall be kept on board the fishing vessel for a period of at least 12 months.

- a) Ensure that the operators of all longline vessels carry line cutters and de-hookers in order to facilitate the appropriate handling and prompt release of marine turtles caught or entangled, and that they do so in accordance with IOTC Guidelines.

OBLIGATION REQUIRED: VESSELS TO CARRY ON BOARD DIP NETS (PURSE SEINERS)

Paragraph 9:

CPCs with purse seine vessels that fish for species covered by the IOTC Agreement shall:

- a) Ensure that operators of such vessels, while fishing in the IOTC area:
 - iv. Carry and employ dip nets, when appropriate, to handle marine turtles.

Resolution 12/06 *On reducing incidental bycatch of seabirds in longline fisheries*

OBLIGATION REQUIRED: VESSELS TO USE MITIGATION MEASURES SOUTH OF 25°S (LONGLINERS)

Paragraph 5:

In the area south of 25 degrees South latitude, CPCs shall ensure that all longline vessels use at least two of the three mitigation measures in Table 1. These measures should also be considered for implementation in other areas, as appropriate, consistent with scientific advice.

Prohibition/ban for vessels

Resolution 19/03 *On the conservation of mobulid rays caught in association with fisheries in the IOTC area of competence*

PROHIBITION TO: SET ANY GEAR TYPE ON MOBULID RAYS

Paragraph 2:

CPCs shall prohibit all vessels from intentionally setting any gear type for targeted fishing of mobulid rays in the IOTC Area of Competence, if the animal is sighted prior to commencement of the set.

PROHIBITION TO: RETAIN ONBOARD, TRANSHIP, LAND, STORE MOBULID RAYS

Paragraph 3:

CPCs shall prohibit all vessels retaining onboard, transshipping, landing, storing, any part or whole carcass of mobulid rays caught in the IOTC Area of Competence.

PROHIBITION TO: GAFF, LIFT BY THE GILL SLITS/SPIRACLES, PUNCH HOLES THROUGH THE BODIES. OBLIGATION TO RELEASE ALIVE, IMPLEMENTATION OF LIVE RELEASE HANDLING PROCEDURES OF MOBULID RAYS

Paragraph 5:

CPCs shall require all their fishing vessels, other than those carrying out subsistence fishery, to promptly release alive and unharmed, to the extent practicable, mobulid rays as soon as they are seen in the net, on the hook, or on the deck, and do it in a manner that will result in the least possible harm to the individuals captured. The handling procedures detailed in Annex I, while taking into consideration the safety of the crew shall be implemented and followed.

Resolution 18/05 *On Management Measures for the Conservation of the Billfishes: Striped Marlin, Black Marlin, Blue Marlin and Indo-Pacific Sailfish*

PROHIBITION TO: RETAIN ON BOARD, TRANSHIP, LAND, ANY STRIPED MARLIN, BLACK MARLIN, BLUE MARLIN, INDO-PACIFIC SAILFISH SMALLER THAN 60 CM LOWER JAW FORK LENGTH

Paragraph 5:

CPCs shall not retain on board, trans-ship, land, any specimen smaller than 60 cm Lower Jaw Fork Length (LJFL) of any of the species referred to in paragraph 2, but shall return them immediately to the sea in a manner that maximizes post-release survival potential without compromising the safety of crew

Resolution 17/07 *On the prohibition to use large-scale driftnets in the IOTC area*

PROHIBITION FROM: USING LARGE-SCALE DRIFTNETS IN THE ENTIRE IOTC AREA OF COMPETENCE

Paragraph 3:

Each Contracting Party and Cooperating Non-Contracting party (hereinafter referred to as CPCs) shall take all measures necessary to prohibit their fishing vessels from using large-scale driftnets while on the high seas in the IOTC area of competence. They shall take all measures necessary to prohibit their fishing vessels from using large-scale driftnets in the entire IOTC area of competence by 1 January 2022.

[Valid for Pakistan under Resolution 12/12 paragraph 2 on high seas.]

Resolution 17/05 *Concerning the conservation of sharks caught in association with fisheries managed by IOTC*

PROHIBITION TO: FIN SHARKS

Paragraph 3:

a) Sharks landed fresh: CPCs shall prohibit the removal of shark fins on board vessels. CPCs shall prohibit the landing, retention on-board, transshipment and carrying of shark fins which are not naturally attached to the shark carcass until the first point of landing.

b) Sharks landed frozen: CPCs that do not apply sub-paragraph 3 a) for all sharks shall require their vessels to not have on board fins that total more than 5% of the weight of sharks on board, up to the first point of landing. CPCs that currently do not require fins and carcasses to be offloaded together at the point of first landing shall take the necessary measures to ensure compliance with the 5 % ratio through certification, monitoring by an observer, or other appropriate measures.

Resolution 16/08 *On the prohibition of the use of aircrafts and unmanned aerial vehicles as fishing aids*

PROHIBITION TO: USE AIRCRAFTS AND UNMANNED AERIAL VEHICLES

Paragraph 1:

Contracting Parties and Cooperating Non-Contracting Party (collectively CPCs) shall prohibit their flagged fishing vessels, support and supply vessels from using aircrafts and unmanned aerial vehicles as fishing aids.

Resolution 16/07 *On the use of artificial lights to attract fish.*

PROHIBITION TO: USE SURFACE OR SUBMERGED ARTIFICIAL LIGHTS TO ATTRACT FISH

Paragraph 1 and 2:

1. Fishing vessels and other vessels including support, supply and auxiliary vessels flying the flag of an IOTC Contracting Party or Cooperating Non-Contracting Party (collectively CPCs) are prohibited from using, installing or operating surface or submerged artificial lights for the purpose of aggregating tuna and tuna-like species beyond territorial waters. The use of lights on DFADs is also already prohibited.

2. CPCs shall prohibit their flagged vessels from intentionally conducting fishing activities around or near any vessel or DFAD equipped with artificial lights for the purpose of attracting tuna and tuna-like species under the mandate of the IOTC and in the IOTC area of competence.

Resolution 13/06 *On a scientific and management framework on the conservation of shark species caught in association with IOTC managed fisheries*

PROHIBITION TO: RETAIN ONBOARD, TRANSHIP, LAND, STORE OCEANIC WHITETIP SHARKS

Paragraph 3:

Notwithstanding paragraphs 1 and 2, CPCs shall prohibit, as an interim pilot measure, all fishing vessels flying their flag and on the IOTC Record of Authorised Vessels, or authorised to fish for tuna or tuna-like species managed by the IOTC on the high seas to retain onboard, tranship, land or store any part or whole carcass of oceanic whitetip sharks with the exception of paragraph 7. The provisions of this measure do not apply to artisanal fisheries operating exclusively in their respective Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) for the purpose of local consumption.

Resolution 13/05 *On the conservation of whale sharks (Rhincodon typus)*

PROHIBITION TO: SET PURSE SEINE NET AROUND A WHALE SHARK

Paragraph 2:

Contracting Parties and Cooperating Non-Contracting Parties (collectively, CPCs) shall prohibit their flagged vessels from intentionally setting a purse seine net around a whale shark in the IOTC area of competence, if it is sighted prior to the commencement of the set.

Resolution 13/04 *On the conservation of cetaceans*

PROHIBITION TO: SET PURSE SEINE NET AROUND A CETACEAN

Paragraph 2:

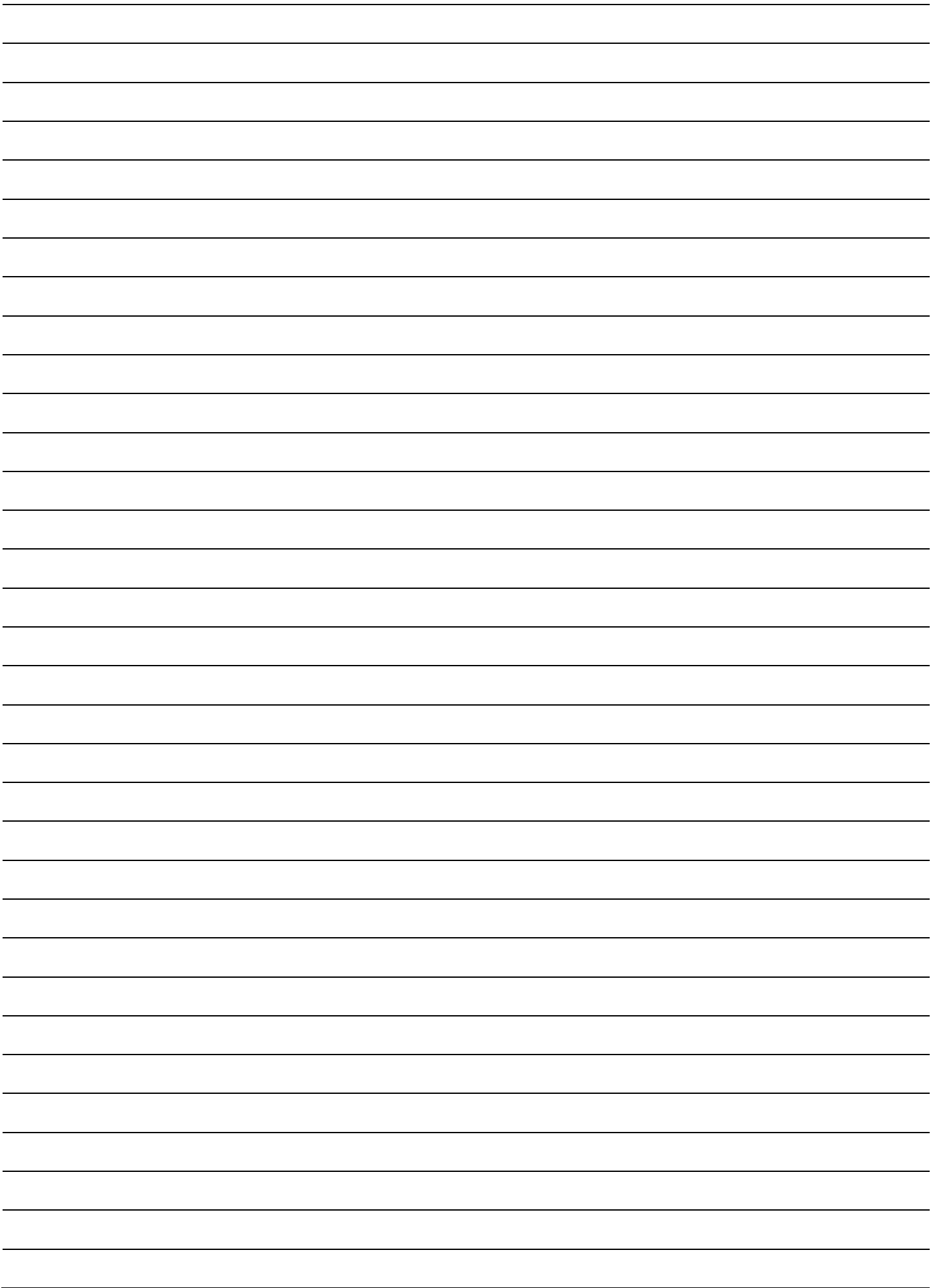
Contracting Parties and Cooperating Non-Contracting Parties (collectively, CPCs) shall prohibit their flagged vessels from intentionally setting a purse seine net around a cetacean in the IOTC area of competence, if the animal is sighted prior to the commencement of the set.

Resolution 12/09 *On the conservation of thresher sharks (family Alopiidae) caught in association with fisheries in the IOTC area of competence*

PROHIBITION TO: RETAIN ONBOARD, TRANSHIP, LAND, STORE, SELL THRESHER SHARKS OF ALL THE SPECIES OF THE FAMILY ALOPIIDAE

Paragraph 2:

Fishing Vessels flying the flag of an IOTC Member or Cooperating Non-Contracting Party (CPCs) are prohibited from retaining on board, transshipping, landing, storing, selling or offering for sale any part or whole carcass of thresher sharks of all the species of the family Alopiidae, with the exception of paragraph 7.



IOTC Members and non-members

Commission Contracting Parties (Members)

Membership of IOTC is open to Indian Ocean coastal countries and to countries or regional economic integration organisations which are members of the UN or one of its specialised agencies, and are fishing for tuna in the Indian Ocean. There are currently 31 Contracting Parties (Members), the majority of which are Nation States.

Commission Cooperating Non-Contracting Parties (CNCP)

In addition to being a full Member, States with a real interest in the Indian Ocean fisheries of tuna and tuna-like species can participate in the IOTC process as a Cooperating Non-Contracting Party (CNCP). This status is granted for a period of one year, upon request from the State. CNCPs are not obliged to pay a financial contribution, but they do not enjoy voting rights on IOTC matters, and they are subject to the same regulations as the full Members. CNCP status is reviewed annually by the Commission.

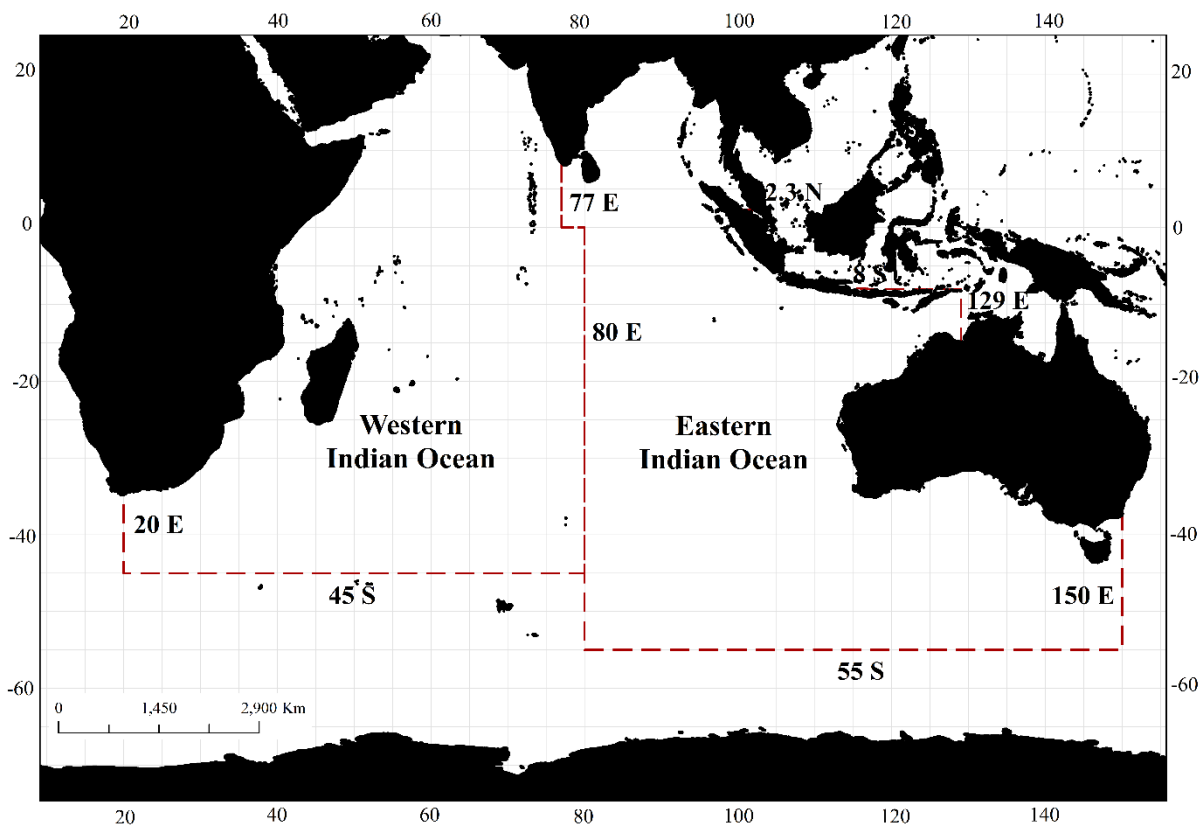

IOTC Area of Competence

IOTC Agreement: Article II. AREA OF COMPETENCE

"The area of competence of the Commission (hereinafter referred to as the "Area") shall be the Indian Ocean (defined for the purpose of this Agreement as being FAO statistical areas 51 and 57 as shown on the map set out in Annex A to this Agreement) and adjacent seas, north of the Antarctic Convergence, insofar as it is necessary to cover such seas for the purpose of conserving and managing stocks that migrate into or out of the Indian Ocean."

Note: The Commission, at its 4th Session in 1999 agreed to modify the western boundary of the IOTC area of competence from 30°E to 20°E, thus eliminating the gap between the areas covered by IOTC and ICCAT.
